### Creative thinking

It's time to get creative! More and more people are making, crafting and designing their own stuff. It's satisfying and fun to do, and it means that you can have things that no one else has. It saves you money too! If you really enjoy it, you could even end up designing or making things for a living.

#### **Get the gear!**

The projects in this book mostly use sewing and craft materials such as card, glue, felt, fabric, thread, pins, needles, ribbons and buttons. You may have a lot of these at home anyway. If not, there's an equipment guide on page 30 to show you where you can find them.

#### A room of your own

Your bedroom is your own place, where you can chill out with friends, read, chat or spend time on hobbies. Use the projects in this book to stamp your own style on your space - as well as making it more cosy and comfy.

#### Safety

Remember to keep strings, cords and sharp things like pins, needles and scissors away from small children.



### Little birds

These cute birds are easy to make. Hang them from your window frame, wall or bed.

#### **Get the gear!**

- Tracing paper and pencil
- 2 pieces of felt fabric, about 12cm square
- Scissors, pins and needles
- Colourful strong thread or embroidery thread
- Tape measure or ruler
- About 10cm of thin ribbon or wool
- Handful of soft toy stuffing (from a craft shop) – or you can use bundled-up knitting wool
- 2 buttons or beads for eyes

Lay your two pieces of felt one on top of the other, and pin the paper shape on top.
Then cut around the shape, through both layers of felt.
Take off the pins and paper.

Trace this bird shape onto tracing paper, and cut it out.

Make your piece of ribbon or wool into a loop and put it between the felt pieces, as shown. Pin the two pieces together, leaving enough space to sew around the edge of the bird.




### Wall stencils

Jazz up your bedroom walls with patterns or pictures, using special decorating **stencils**. You can buy them, but it's more fun to make your own. (Check with a parent or carer before decorating your bedroom walls, though!)

#### **Get the gear!**

- Thin card
- Pencil
- Sharp scissors or a craft knife
- Removable sticky tape or masking tape
- Leftover emulsion wall paint or acrylic paint. Metallic paint would work well.
- Small decorating paintbrush or large art paintbrush
- Old clothes and newspapers

Draw your stencil designs onto card. They should be simple outline shapes, such as stars and moons, simple animals, hearts, arrows or leaves.







# Recycled waste paper basket

Every bedroom needs a waste paper basket – and this one is made from recycled waste paper!

#### **Get the gear!**

- Lots of old newspapers
- PVA glue or sticky tape
- Scissors

Now to make your basket.

Take six strips and lie them down together. Take another strip, and weave it over and under the six strips, so it ends up in the middle, like this.

First make the strips your basket will be made from. Take a sheet of newspaper and fold it over and over to make a flat strip about 3cm wide and 60cm long. Use glue or sticky tape to hold it in place.

Take the next strip, and do the same, but go under the strips you went over before, and over the strips you went under before, like this.
